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Advice to Parents of Children Having Dilating Drops

Letter to parents of child patients in the eye clinic

Dear Parents,

When your child comes to the eye clinic, it is usually necessary to look at the back of their eyes and to check whether they have a refractive error (long or short sightedness).

To do this, we will need to put some dilating drops into their eyes, which will make the pupil (black part of the eye) bigger. This does not hurt your child but may sting a bit as the drops go in. He / she will need to stay still while we do this. The nurses are very experienced in putting eye drops in children's eyes and we have different ways of doing this using toys, bubbles etc.

It can take 30-40 minutes for the pupils to dilate properly. For dark eyes it may be necessary to insert more drops, which could mean up to an hour to dilate the pupils.

The eye drops wear off in two stages. Ability to focus returns first, in about 2-3 hours and your child will be able to read again.

Dilated pupils often do not return to normal until the next day, but they always return to normal and this should not be a cause for concern. Often the pupils will look unequal as they return to normal.

Your child may return to school despite the eye drops, and their teacher should be told that they will have reading difficulties for a few hours. He / she may play outside immediately. The light sensitivity is not usually troublesome, but if the light should bother your child, sunglasses or a hat with a brim will help.
